FRIENDS TRUSTEES AND OFFICERS MAKE PLANS FOR THE FUTURE OF THE MILITARY MUSEUM

At a meeting of the Board of Trustees held on December 16, 2024, the Board of the Friends of the New York State Military Museum adopted its Strategic Plan 2025, a plan for the Museum moving forward.

According to new Friends President Mark O'Rourke, the Board is "looking to create a comprehensive and highly prioritized plan that we can execute as quickly as possible" to "ensure that we provide robust support to the Museum in a way that meets the most pressing needs."

At the same time, O'Rourke enunciated a list of the Board's priorities at the current time, as it looks to the future of the Museum.

Here is a summary of that list of priorities:

Finance: Enhance reporting and audit capabilities

Digital and IT: Website and social media enhancements

Global War on Terror and Lecture Series: Awareness and funding

Store: Modernize operations and create e-commerce platform

<u>Preserving Our Military Heritage Awards</u>: Planning for October event (including date and venue)

Museum Expansion: Potential private sector match

Strategic Partnerships: Build with key stakeholders

<u>Development</u>: Corporate support, crowdfunding, board contributions, foundation grants, planned giving, fundraising campaign, online donations

ORAL HISTORY INTERVIEW: COL. DENNIS WHITE

US Army Col. Dennis J. White (Ret.) was interviewed on February 19, 2025 by Museum Volunteers Fred Katz and Wayne Rozen, in the Saratoga Room at the NYS Military Museum, for the Museum's Oral History Project.

Col. White served in both the New York Army National Guard and the Army Reserves, in medical positions including medical entomologist and force health protection officer; he also served as Commander. His service occurred both in the United States and on multiple deployments to foreign locations. He joined the Guard — commissioned as a Captain — on November 9, 1989. As White pointed out, it was the same day on which the Berlin Wall fell. At that time, White was working for the New York State Department of Health, where he had started in June 1976 and continued until July 2021. His work at the Department focused largely on insect borne diseases, such as Lyme Disease and West Nile Virus.

White served in the Guard from 1989-2000, becoming Commander of the 244th Medical Brigade, and actually had an office in the building now housing the Museum. While serving as Commander, White dealt with the major ice storm that hit the region in 1999. He recalled, in particular, that conditions caused by the ice storm created havoc in Clinton County for about six weeks, and parts of that County lost power for weeks.

White transferred to the Army Reserves in 2000. While in the Reserves, he took part in two major deployments — to Kosovo and Kuwait. The deployment to Kosovo occurred from October 2002 to April 2003. In Kosovo, the Americans were part of a NATO peacekeeping force. White's medical units took part in providing medical, dental and eye care for the local people, as well as in supporting the schools.

One of the challenges in Kosovo was that both Serbs and Albanians lived there—two groups with a longstanding enmity toward each other. Despite that enmity, White noted that the experience in Kosovo that left the greatest impression on him was "[w]hile in Kosovo, our American troops developed [the] mission to support schools and school children for both the Albanian and Serb villages, but all shared the same sentiments, regardless of national affiliation."

White was deployed to Kuwait from December 2003 to February 2005, in support of the soldiers who were taking part in the action in Iraq. The medical units in that deployment played a major role in treating wounded soldiers. As White explained, soldier would be treated in locations in Iraq, including Saddam Hussein's old hospital. Seriously wounded soldiers would typically be treated at that location, and then transferred to hospitals first in Germany and then in the United States.

When asked about the people he worked with during his service, White said that the people were "100% effective, professional & mission oriented." White said that he would have liked to have stayed in the service longer. He added, "I still miss it."




Feb. 1, 2:00pm - The Black Woods: Pursuing Racial Justice on the Adirondack Frontier

Mar. 8, 2:00pm - Man of Fire: William Tecumseh Sherman in the Civil War




Historian Derek Maxfield examines the life and career of General William Tecumseh Sherman, one of the Civil War's most peculiar and compelling characters.
